### New Sermon Series -Living Our Faith

Beginning in January, we will be starting an exciting new Sermon Series and explore a number of themes related to our spiritual formation and personal discipleship as we continue to live out Trinity's vision to Worship, Grow, and Serve!

As faithful disciples, my hope is that we can embrace new and deeper expressions of commitment to Christ and His church in the coming year. This new series will be a great place to begin, as we explore what it might mean to "Live out Our Faith" daily in the following expressions of our Christian journey.

#### Living Our Faith...

Jan. 1 - Living our Faith through Covenant

Jan. 8 - Living our Faith through Baptism

Jan. 15 - Living our Faith through Diversity

Jan. 22 - Living our Faith through Commitment

Jan. 29 - Living our Faith through Music

During the month of January, we will focus on the different aspects of renewing our faith and our discipleship as Christ Followers and Servants within and beyond the walls of the church.

#### **Covenant Renewal**

John Wesley began utilizing the Covenant Renewal Service on August 11, 1755, in what was probably the first real celebration of "Covenant Renewal" in the early Methodist movement. Wesley found the service of renewal rich and meaningful, as expressed in his Journal, " ... many mourned before God, and many were comforted." (April 1756); "It was, as usual, a time of remarkable blessing ... and an occasion for a variety of spiritual experiences." (October 1765) The heart of the service is focused in the covenant prayer, and asks those participating to commit or recommit themselves to God. We are all called to live in covenant with each other as Christians and to be intentional in our faith practices and acts of services for others.

#### **Baptism Renewal**

The renewal of our Baptismal Covenant is affirming God's Word to us, proclaiming



our adoption by grace, and our word to God, promising our response of faith and love. The sacrament of baptism itself is an act that looks back with gratitude on what God's grace has already accomplished (prevenient grace). When the sacrament of baptism is administered, it is an act of God's grace, and helps us looks forward to what God's grace will accomplish in the future(sanctifying grace). When we renew or reaffirm our baptismal vows, it can be for us, a celebration of new beginnings in the new year and a symbolic way to recommit ourselves to Christ and the Church. All Christians are encouraged to reaffirm their baptismal covenant at significant moments in their Christian journey. While reaffirmation is not to be considered as baptism, it can provide a meaningful time of renewal for every Christian.

#### **Embracing our Diversity**

Bishop Carter has asked that in honor of the Martin Luther King Jr. Day scheduled for January 16, 2017, all Florida Annual Conference clergy and churches are encouraged to work toward a pulpit exchange with another church in their local community on that Sunday. The goal of the pulpit exchange and sermon focus would be to preach the gospel and encourage relationships and dialogue across racial and cultural lines as together we follow Jesus into the unity of the one body of Christ. It is our eternal hope that our congregations will continue to be transformed into instruments of justice, reconciliation, mercy and healing. I have invited the Rev. Dr. Latricia Scrivens to be our preacher that day and I will be preaching at FAMU's Wesley Foundation




# A Note from Lisa ...

On Tuesday November the 29th, a few families from the Tallahassee Homeschool Group (THG) participated in an organ tour hosted by our organist, Viktor Billa. Our family has been part of THG, an eclectic group of homeschool families for over seven years. Among the various things we do is to organize field trips. Viktor gave a detailed presentation of the history of the organ, how it has evolved through time, showed us pictures of its many phases, and answered all the questions the adults and children had about the organ and his experience as an organist. Hearing Viktor perform is always a sublime or exciting experience for our family, but this time I especially enjoyed the children's faces in awe looking at Viktor playing the different parts of the organ, and following the music coming from the pipes. At the end, Viktor let the children try the organ regardless if they could play piano or not. While

the children were playing, he pressed the many stops to create different sounds. This was a lot of fun for everybody. They were very pleased with the whole experience and some were talking about a second trip for those who could
